To support all these eager new musicians, the program employed the talents of four instructors (mentors), one junior mentor, and one volunteer mentor.



With a focus on youth in vulnerable communities, our Centre for Arts and Music (CAM) Program reaches out to children who may otherwise have few opportunities to participate in the arts. We reach them during that critical time after the bell rings, right in their school. Youth learn how to write songs, play instruments and perform together on stage. In the process, they earn self-esteem, respect for themselves and others, and much needed self-confidence. Studies show that youth who are exposed to the arts do better in school and other areas of life. We see this firsthand every day, and local agencies confirm the positive impact the program is having in the lives of these children. In fact, one agency advised that serious incidents at their centre dropped from several per month to zero as a result of student engagement in CAM.

We've been proudly operating this program has since 2011.
